2 Chronicle 36: 14-16, 19-23; Ps 136; Ephesians 2: 4-10; John 3:14-21

THE OUTSTRETCHED HANDS OF JESUS

Today's Gospel Reading begins with Jesus healing a man with leprosy. Leprosy is a disfiguring, infectious skin disease that has been surrounded by many social and religious taboos throughout history.

In Jesus' time, the examination of skin diseases was done by the priests in accordance with the Law of Moses, and if leprosy was identified, the person was declared unclean. People with leprosy lived in isolation from the community. Anyone who touched them would also be unclean.

Jesus once again showed his compassion and power as the Divine Healer. He said to the leper: "Of course I want to - be cured". The leper was healed. However, before saying those words, Jesus did something unusual and even unthinkable: "Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand and touched him." In the sight of the Jewish leaders, touching a leper is such a horrible thing to do. Jesus could be contaminated and declared unclean, and more importantly, he could be accused of violating the Law. But he did not mind, rather he showed his love to the leper.

Jesus' action here reveals important lessons for us. This was an expression of his overwhelming desire to reach out to people, especially those who are in need, the sick, the sinners and the outcasts. "Those who are well do not need a physician, but the sick do. I did not come to call the righteous but sinners." This was always his mission in accordance with the Mystery of the Incarnation. God became man so that He could touch us and be one with us, especially in our misery and suffering. With this touch of Jesus, the leper was healed and could now go back to his family and community – not anymore an outcast. The healing touch of Jesus gave him new life. So, let us go to Jesus with simplicity, humility and hope just as the leper did in today's Gospel.

SEASON OF LENT

Lent is the time of repentance, prayer and fasting, consisting of 40 days starting from Ash Wednesday. It is a day of fasting and abstinence when ashes are blessed and imposed on the head of the faithful to remind of their call to holiness. Christians are reminded to repent from their sins and seek spiritual renewal by means of prayer, fasting, almsgiving and charity. Lent is also a time to reflect more deeply on Jesus' journey to Calvary. Every year during the season of Lent we used to have the traditional devotion of Stations of the Cross. HOW WE WILL DISTRIBUTE THE ASHES THIS YEAR

The Priest says the prayer for blessing the ashes. He sprinkles the ashes with holy water, without saying anything. Then he addresses all those present and only once says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: "Repent, and believe in the Gospel", or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return".

The Priest then cleanses his hands, puts on a face mask and distributes the ashes to those who come to those who are standing in their places. The Priest takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything.

This instructions are given by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, 12 January 2021.


